

### From the Vicar

Loving Lent? Loving *in* Lent? The next "must have/must do" season is nearly upon us. Visit many of the shops – be they stationers, chocolate, clothing, food or even on-line – and we cannot help noticing that the pressure is on to buy something special for our loved one. All, so adverts would suggest, in memory of a certain Valentine.

There are several stories associated with St Valentine What is certain is that he was martyred for refusing to give up Christianity, and that he died in AD269. One legend has it that he died on the same day (modern 14<sup>th</sup> February) that had been devoted by the Romans to love lotteries. In one variant St Valentine left a farewell note for the jailer's daughter, who had become his friend, and signed it "From Your Valentine". Another variant depends on the significance of February 14<sup>th</sup> as a feast marked by the Romans to honour Juno, the Oueen of the Roman gods and goddesses. Juno was also revered as the goddess of women and marriage. On the eve of the feast of Lupercalia (which would be today's February 15<sup>th</sup>) the custom was for young men to draw lots for names of girls who would be their partner for the duration of the feast. What would happen then cannot be described in this Magazine! ... but we can understand that if Valentine was to be faithful to the one true God, he had to refuse all such pagan practices – and by implication to stand against the prevailing ethos of the state. Such a stand has always had its price – under the Romans, often the ultimate.

We certainly want to celebrate an appropriate love token both in its own right, and as a gift from God himself. Where we part company with society is over the commercialism and the prevailing ethos that we must spend, spend, spend. Some might say that the current slow-down in the economy is a sorry reminder that a society built so largely on consumption is bankrupt of spirituality, and bound to fall.

Which is perhaps where the ancient discipline of Lent may help. Forty days of quiet reflection of where we and society are heading, and an opportunity to turn back to a proper and authentic lifestyle. Forty days to realise what the sin of the world cost God, and continues to cost him. Forty days to make a difference for ourselves and those around us - including our dearest and best Valentine. Let's mark Lent as St Valentine himself would have done!

### Isn't Lent early this Year?

Yes, it is: Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, is set by the date of Easter Sunday, which is the Sunday following the date of the paschal full moon for the year. In June 325 AD astronomers approximated astronomical full moon dates for the Christian church, calling them ecclesiastical full moon dates and from 326 AD the paschal full moon date has always been the ecclesiastical full moon date after March 20 (which was the equinox date in 325 AD). Thus, for our western tradition the earliest date on which Easter can occur is 22 March. The date of the Orthodox Easter differ from ours since it is based on the original calculation using the Julian calendar and converted to the equivalent date in the Gregorian calendar now in use.

The last year in which Easter Sunday was that early was in 1818 and before that in 1041. The next will be in 2285!

In 2008 we shall celebrate Easter on 23 March, still very early. Not since 1913 has it been so early and prior to that in 1856. The next will be in 2160.

### Lord, Prop us up in 2008

An old farmer in the village attended the church's New Year prayer meeting. He stood up and made one simple request for 2008: "Lord, prop us up on our leanin' side." Intrigued, the minister asked afterwards what he had meant.

The farmer explained: "I've got an old barn in my field. It's been there a long time. It's gone through a lot of storms, and it's stood for many years. It's still standing, but just before Christmas I noticed it was leaning to one side a bit. So I went and got some poles and propped it up on its leaning side. I made sure it wouldn't fall over this coming year.

"Then I got to thinking about how much I am like that old barn. I've been around a long time, I've withstood a lot of bad weather in life, and I'm still standing, too. But by the end of 2007, what with Foot and Mouth and Blue Tongue, I found myself leaning to one side a bit. So for 2008 I've asked the Lord to prop me up on my leanin' side. I figure he can make sure that I don't fall over, either."

### Signs & Symbols: the Fish

Have you heard of the fish symbol used by Christians? There are a number of symbols that we deliberately use both in our churches and as Christians generally.

The 'fish' was used by Christians in the first century as a way to identify themselves to other believers. When persecution against the church was fierce, Christians needed to communicate in a secret way that would not attract non-believers' attention. So they scrawled a simple fish on things: in the sand, on trees, on buildings. It told other Christians that here was a Christian. Today you can see the symbol on the back of cars, on lapel badges, as necklaces, and on various advertising signs. A fish tells you that the proprietor is a Christian.

Why a fish? The fish sign comes from the Greek word for fish – Ichthus. If you take each Greek letter as the start of a Greek word then the meaning comes out as follows:

I = Jesus: Ch = Christ: Th = God's Son: U = Our: S = Saviour
