




I wonder if you too saw the excellent "Britain from the Air" series of programmes produced by Andrew Marr. Space allows me here only to share two of many insights which impressed me: (1) Day and night, and in all weathers, helicopters are flying beside National Grid's overhead powerlines, using heatsensing cameras to detect 'hot-spots', indicative of where a failure would soon occur if immediate repairs were not arranged. The courage of the pilots in working hour after hour so close to lethal voltages was awesome. (And I don't want to think of the linesmen who would later be working on those lines!). Or, (2) on our roads all those lorries, each scheduled to be at its own specified rendez-vous within a one-hour window so that it can meet up with its preprepared cargoes which are already on the way from up to a mile away within vast warehouses. Any hint of a traffic jam on the M25 would mean an even bigger clog-up on the country's production lines.

These excerpts, and many others, have caused me to reflect on what an ever thinner line our society is treading between order and chaos. Even for those lorries restricted to the outer lanes, life is actually lived "in the fast lane". As are so many personal relationships. Some might say we are trying impossibly to live at the speed of light – no wonder there are breakdowns.

Against this otherwise depressing trend, it is wonderful to report that there are increasing numbers of people who realise that the above fast life on the brink is a travesty of what we are made for. To cite an example from many: in our parish alone, two groups of people – one adult and one teens – are meeting weekly to explore who God is. So far we've had amazing discussions about Creation, and Design (of the world); God's love in Jesus (look up John 3:16 to see how that affects everyone!). We are realising that there is another way – we might call it the "Be still and know that I am God" way – for which this world was made, even if it often goes in the opposite direction. On past experience, most of those taking part in these courses will probably want to take some positive step of extra commitment to God, and we are looking forward to Confirmations probably later this month.

For those of us not on such a course, but who long for respite from the fast lane, why not come to the next Healing and Wholeness service being held at St Lawrence's on 12th October? A quieter hour in which to receive God's peace and restoration.

Pilgrim Places - Whitby

The Christian faith in England has long been associated with places like Glastonbury, Canterbury, York and London. But the town of Whitby, on the north Yorkshire coast, can also lay claim to its own historic Christian roots.

Overlooking a vast expanse of the North Sea, and with its rocky headland and high cliffs, Whitby is one of the favourite seaside attractions in the north east of England. With some narrow winding streets and its associations with Captain James Cook, Whitby has an olde-world feeling about it. More recently it has been one of the locations for the TV hospital drama The Royal.

High on the headland stand the ruins of St Hilda's Abbey and that's the clue to its link with early British Christianity. Hilda was connected by birth to King Edwin of Northumbria and

by birth to King Edwin of Northumbria and sometime around 627 AD she was converted to the Christian faith. After missionary work in Co Durham, she was appointed by the Christian King Oswy of Northumbria as the first Abbess of the newly-founded Abbey at the place later named Whitby.

The Abbey soon had a reputation as a great centre of Christian missions and learning but it was a gathering of royalty, bishops and monks that was to give Whitby lasting fame. The occasion was the Synod of Whitby in 664AD, a gathering of Britain's Christian leaders that would determine the shape of Christianity in these islands until the Reformation. That story, however, begins much earlier.

It would be exciting to know exactly when the Christian faith arrived in these islands and who brought it to us. There have been many suggestions but a very probable answer is that Christian missionaries from Gaul (now France) crossed the English Channel to bring the Good News to our pagan ancestors. A probable date is sometime in the early third century, between 200 and 250AD, thought it might have been considerably earlier.

A hundred years later the faith had spread widely and there were Christian settlements in many parts of England and Wales. Ireland was evangelised in the 5th century and, in turn, Irish missionaries took the gospel to Scotland.



stiffness, but not every patient will experience all of these (many people have a slight tremor which is not connected with Parkinson's). Other symptoms may include sleep difficulties, bladder or bowel problems, memory loss and changes to sense, smell and taste.

The main aim of many treatments is to replace the missing dopamine (a kind of hormone) in the brain. A drug called Levodopa, a natural amino-acid, is often very effective when first used but less so over time. A number of other drugs have proved useful and a form of surgery called Deep Brain Stimulation can help some patients. It involves implanting a wire, with four electrodes at its tip, in target sites in the brain. A small battery implanted in the person's chest generates electrical signals for the stimulation, which alleviates symptoms.

Various health professionals, working as a team, can do a lot for patients. They may include occupational and speech therapists, for example, and physiotherapists. The Parkinson's Disease Society provides support and advice to patients, carers and families – and has 330 local branches throughout the UK. It also funds research into the disease and the search for ways of preventing it.

Parkinson's Disease

The feast day of St Luke the Physician falls in October, so the following article by Philip Barron would be timely.

Parkinson's Disease is named after Dr James Parkinson (1755-1824), a London doctor who was the first person to give a clear description of the condition. There is a blue plaque to his memory outside the house in Hoxton Square where he lived and practised.

The disease is usually diagnosed after the age of 60, although one in 20 sufferers is under 40 at the time of diagnosis. It occurs when the cells in the brain that control movement are lost and it affects talking, walking, swallowing and writing. About 120,000 people in the UK have the disease. There is no cure, but much can be done to relieve symptoms.

The three main symptoms are tremor, slowness of movement and muscle

Update on St Lawrence Graveyard

Firstly, a big thank you to everyone who has already written in response to our appeal last month for views on how the ashes of those who have been cremated should be buried and marked in St Lawrence's churchyard.

To remind you of the background:- Our church council had proposed individual memorial tablets laid flat, but the Diocesan Advisory Committee have responded that they have not recently recommend such a practice; instead they suggest a number of larger upright stones with multiple names on them, and no local designation.

Quite apart from the larger up-front costs of providing and updating such stones, we believe the diocese's proposals take no account of everything that we have heard about families' natural wishes for good local designation, and the possibility for later members of the family to be added on the same memorial. Our proposal also has the virtue of easier maintenance.

This is, of course, not just a matter for our Church Council but for everyone living in or connected with our parish.

So can we repeat - If YOU have a view on whether the graves for ashes should be separately or communally identified, or indeed have other insights, please let us know in writing, as we may well appeal but would then need all the support we can show.

Children: Help design our parish Christmas card!

No, Christmas doesn't come for quite some time yet, but we do need to think ahead! So here's a chance for you to be the person who provides the picture which is on the front of our parish Christmas card! The deadline to receive your pictures is **Sunday 2nd November** (in church, or sent to the vicarage). But please don't wait till then – do it soon!

Parents: So that the design can be printed clearly, here are some suggestions for your child:-

- Draw it on A4 paper (we'll scale down). A landscape orientation makes a more stable card than portrait, though either can be used
- Keep it simple good solid outlines
- If using colour, just colour a few items, brightly.
- Keep the subject matter Christmassy (so not a picture of our church, lovely though it is!) – baby Jesus, Mary, Joseph, crib, stars, shepherds, or angels. But try not to include all of these, or the picture will probably be too cluttered

St Lawrence Stitchers

The first major project by our sociable, hardworking group is complete and should be in church in October. Part of the project is a beautiful set of cushion and matching kneeler for the Minister's seat which have been expertly stitched

by several members of the group but mainly by Rosemary Attenborough (kneeler) and Ethelwyn Osborne (cushion). These matching pieces feature many pairs of stylised fish swimming through a trellis and each piece has a pair of open books with the initials PJA on the sides. Funding for this set was from the generous donations given in memory of Philip Attenborough and his memory is symbolised both by the books and the fish, representing



his career in publishing and his passion for fishing. The fish is also the Anglican symbol for Christ.

Two other pieces the group have been working on are a pair of congregational kneelers which are higher than the norm in recognition of the fact that several of us are becoming less agile and require a higher position for the knees when praying.

The success of the stitching group, which includes local friends who are not all regular attenders at St. Lawrence's, has prompted us to continue meeting to stitch two new projects.

We were all delighted to hear that Ellen Wakeham has an appointment as curate at St. Lawrence Church, Scunthorpe and our stitching group will be designing and making her first celebratory stole. We have discussed with Ellen her ideas and thoughts for the style and size of the stole which her father, Johny will draw and we will embroider then make up the stole ready for Ellen's appointment next June.

Additionally, the PCC has agreed for the group to design and make cushions for the pews in the chancel. The design will be inspired by and reflect the colours and style of the new woven altar and sanctuary kneelers, and will be stitched in tent stitch using wool on canvas. Funding for these new pew seats has been generously donated by Rosemary Attenborough. These latest projects will keep our happy group busy for the next few years.
