Springtime and Harvest did not fail again this year. In fact at our Harvest Supper both exceeded most of our expectations! Tables were laden with the tastiest of Cottage Pies and salad followed by a choice of puddings to rival any 5-star meal. We were enjoying coffee when suddenly we heard "Chemi Chemi" in the midst of the hall. One by one choir members joined in and keeping near perfect time, made their way towards the stage.

"Chemi Chemi" is Swahili, meaning The Spring The Spring. The words translate in to "The spring, the spring of eternal life is within me, it is bubbling". It was first sung in Tanzania by the Bukini choir. I am sure that if they had heard it as it was sung at the harvest supper in beautiful harmony they would have been as impressed as we all were. What a bonus to hear it again in Church during Harvest Festival.

Further contributions from the choir were rounded off with the traditional singing of "Bringing in the Sheaves".

The proceeds from the supper, a total of £441.28 will be donated to Farm Africa. This is one of the overseas charities supported by St Lawrence and helps African farmers to provide food for themselves and their families. John Carlisle applied himself very efficiently to organise a raffle and auction to raise a further £229 for SSL Church funds

At our Harvest Festival service Gretel focussed on words which could be made from the letters in "HARVEST". The community at RDM Parakkanvilla a rural project in rural India may HAVE very little but they do not STARVE. Indeed they feed off their faith to enrich their lives in the face of real poverty. St Lawrence collected £310 at the harvest festival to be sent to RDM.

Services in 2016

As you are aware we are still waiting for the Church Commissioners to complete the paperwork to join St Lawrence's and St Margaret's together as a Joint Benefice. Hopefully this paperwork will be completed soon and sometime in the New Year we will be able to celebrate our new status as a Joint Benefice.

Over the coming year we will hold some joint services, as we do now. Our annual Ash Wednesday Holy Communion service alternates between churches, as does our Ascension Day service. During Holy week, we hold joint services on Maundy Thursday and on Good Friday, together in one church on the Thursday and in the other the next day. Our Dedication and Patronal services in June and July are always joint services and we enjoy refreshments together as part of our celebrations.

In 2016 there will two other occasions when we will hold joint services – Candlemas on the 31st of January and a further joint service on the 30th October. Both of these occur on fifth Sundays in the month, so we will be returning to service patterns we kept some years ago.

After the Joint Benefice has come into being we will continue to have the service pattern we have now. Meeting week by week at St Lawrence's at 9.45 am and at St Margaret's at 11.15 am with 8'oclock services on the first Sunday of each month at St Lawrence's and the second Sunday of the month at St Margaret's.

Some Legends (and facts) of Christmas

Where did Christmas stockings come from? No one is really sure, but a story is told of St Nicholas, a bishop who lived in the 4th century, who may have started the custom by accident. St Nicholas was of a wealthy family, and of a generous heart. As Christmas approached one year, he wanted to help a poor family whom he knew, but he did not want them to know it was him. So he climbed up on their roof on Christmas Eve and dropped some coins down the chimney.

The next morning the coins, to the great surprise of the family, were found in the stockings of the ladies, who had hung them to dry by the fire the night before. Every year after that they put their stockings out, in the hope that some more money would fall into them. They told the story of this amazing appearance to their friends and neighbours, and the custom caught on.

World's oldest fake tree: Did you know that it is a family in Wiltshire, the Parkers, who claim to own the world's oldest artificial Christmas tree? It was bought in 1886, and is still put up every year.

It's an ill wind

It's an ill wind that blows nobody any good was first recorded by John Heywood in 1546 but remains true to this day! Wind certainly did not blow out the candles lining the footpath to the Church on the first Sunday evening in November. This attractive and thoughtful illumination was just a foretaste of what proved to be a most enjoyable and successful evening concert. The "Ill wind" from Flanders & Swan was just one of the arias and renditions performed by the renowned tenor Greg Tassell.

Greg was brought up on a hop farm in Kent and attended Exeter University. He is renowned for oratorio appearances in the UK and abroad and also teaches at the University of Kent . Seated comfortably on the pew cushions provided through a legacy from the late Peter Wilson, we enjoyed performances from Handel, Mozart, Gurney and Vaughan Williams. Greg was accompanied by David Flood, the organist and Master of the Choristers at Canterbury Cathedral.

We had the privilege of hearing David played Elgar's Pomp and Circumstance March No.4 on the beautiful St Lawrence organ. Later in the evening we heard recitals by Jean-Jacques Vierne and Eugene Gigout.

Time for a break; a small group of ladies had prepared and decorated attractive punnets of light refreshments. Efficiently and quickly distributed throughout the Church together with a glass of wine, the refreshments were appreciated by all recipients.

Greg resumed with pieces from Benjamin Britten and later followed with Noel Coward's I Travel Alone, Flanders & Swan's The Gasman Cometh and Ill Wind, concluding with Lloyd Webber's Love Changes Everything.

The evening was well supported by over 100 members and friends of St Lawrence who thoroughly enjoyed a very varied and interesting programme which contained "something for everyone". It proved again how members of the St Lawrence family can pull together to deliver a truly successful event.

Carol Lambert had the original concept for this evening which raised over £1,000 for Sevenoaks Area Youth Trust (SAYT) one of the local charities supported by Seal St. Lawrence . SAYT is a Christian Trust which, employs, manages, trains and supports Christian Youth Workers in the Sevenoaks area. They undertake detached youth work in the streets and parks in local towns and villages – wherever young people meet.

Carol and I attended a recent SAYT update meeting in Sevenoaks and came away with the very firm impression that the money will be well spent!

require intensive support for basic needs such as feeding or breathing. June was able to increase the independence of two children, to their great delight, by providing a new wheelchair for one and by simply raising the seat position for the other. The children soon treated us as old friends. The difficulty of maintaining the service was soon illustrated when two of the children were admitted to hospital, each requiring a member of staff to stay with them in hospital. We met the physiotherapist and speech therapists who provide services to the hospice and children in the community. A paediatrician reviews the children twice a week on top of her hospital job.

While in Bucharest we visited St Michael's school for children with Autistic Spectrum Disorder. We were welcomed into each small class and the amazing physiotherapy room. The staff here are key to professional training of other staff throughout Romania.

We were then taken to Pitesti, a large industrial city, to visit St Andrew's hospice which cares for sixteen severely disabled children. Sue was able to meet and take gifts for Nicoleta, the child she supports. Nicoleta was a normal child who suffered severe brain injury from encephalitis and her parents are no longer able look after her. We modified a wheelchair for a child with a tool kit previously provided by June. This site also provides a community physiotherapy and speech therapy service. From here we visited St Christopher's in Curtea De Arges, a village in the hills. Originally a centre for children with hydrocephalus and spina bifida this is now a centre for remedial teaching for school non-attenders and serves the community with education and welfare programmes for children. It is particularly strong in arts and crafts and we came away with lovely souvenirs as well as apples from the orchard! It is also a sheltered holiday centre, but sadly there were insufficient funds this year.

Our final trip was to Cernavoda, near the Black Sea, where the charity began. We were privileged to meet eighteen young people in their twenties who survived AIDS with antiretroviral treatment and now live independently in four (very tidy!) bungalows. It was great to see how they cared for each other and they were very welcoming to us. We visited the cemetery overlooking the Danube where those children who did not survive are buried in a special area marked by simple iron crosses.

We benefited hugely from the visit and would like to thank all the staff from CID and Copii In Dificultate who made the arrangements and were so hospitable. We asked Valentina Zaharia, Executive Director, how we can make a difference. Her main wish was that we make more people aware of the charity so that their work can continue and develop.

#### A Visit to 'Children in Distress' Romania

We were introduced to the charity 'Children in Distress' (CID) by June Hurn, a priest at our former church in Chislehurst. June, a former PE teacher for children with special needs, was an early volunteer and Trustee. She provides and adapts wheelchairs for the children. Sue has supported a child for several years and in 2014 we visited St Margaret's Hospice in Bucharest. Harry is now a Trustee for CID. In October this year we went with June to all the centres set up and supported by CID.

Children in Distress was set up in the early 1990's in response to the crisis in paediatric care services exposed following the Popular Revolution that swept Romania's communist regime from power. The Charity pioneered the treatment and care provision for those infants and children who had been infected with the HIV virus and associated opportunistic life threatening infections. The Charity set up the first paediatric hospice offering respite palliative and end of life care for children living with full blown AIDS.



Children in Distress and its sister Foundation Copii in Dificultate now provide hospice care for children life threatening with conditions as result of accident, infection, genetic disorders and birth defects. They pioneer life changing multiple therapies for those with disabilities and pioneer education and welfare for those living with Autistic Spectrum Disorders.

Educational opportunities

are offered to children from disadvantaged backgrounds and training is made available to educational, medical, nursing and therapy professionals to develop and improve the quality of opportunity and care available throughout Romania and a range of medical and social welfare programmes provide disability, food, clothing, educational material and opportunity to those suffering discrimination and disadvantage.

We stayed at St Margaret's Hospice in Bucharest and were struck again by the dedication of the staff and the friendly, caring atmosphere. The hospice accommodates twenty children aged one to sixteen years with a wide range of problems. The most capable attend school. Others with very severe disabilities

#### A Major New Report on how the C of E manages its 16,000 Churches

As part of its *Reform and Renewal* programme, which was debated in the General Synod in February, the Church of England has now published a report and launched a consultation on proposals to improve support for its 16,000 church buildings.

The report is the first attempt in many years to undertake a comprehensive review of the Church of England's stewardship of its church buildings. It includes a wide range of statistics, a substantial theological reflection and a survey of various initiatives being taken in individual dioceses. It identifies a number of principles that should shape the Church's approach and makes some specific recommendations.

The report comes from the Church Buildings review group, chaired by the Bishop of Worcester, the Rt Revd Dr John Inge. Certainly the group found some big challenges: more than three quarters of the Church of England's churches are listed, and the Church of England is responsible for nearly half of the grade I listed buildings in England. More than half of churches are in rural areas (where 17% of the population lives) and more than 90% of these are listed.

Bishop John says: "Our 16,000 church buildings are a visible sign of ongoing Christian faith in communities throughout England, as well as being an unparalleled part of our country's heritage. This report looks at how we can best support the thousands of local volunteers who care deeply for and about churches and offer wonderful service to their communities using their churches.

"There is no single solution to the challenges posed by our extensive responsibility for part of the nation's heritage. We hope therefore that this work will be a catalyst for discussion." The consultation period runs until Friday 29 January.
